Students Return to In Person Learning!

April 13th marked the first day back for most Lakers choosing to return to in person learning, with 9th graders beginning a day earlier, and special education students a couple weeks prior. There was an excitement as nervous freshman and nostalgic upperclassman funneled inside donning masks and observing social distancing. As they passed under the new main entrance, they were greeted with a massive "Welcome Back Lakers" banner which was donated by Fast Signs, a longtime business partner of the community. Students were also given purple drawstring backpacks with the school and foundation logo. Inside they found two KN95 masks and an Amanda Gorman print with a quote from her inauguration speech, drawn by alumni Adam Johnson.

With a student body of about 1,800, roughly half elected to return for in person learning, while the rest will remain in distance learning. The largest percentage of in person learners by grade belongs to the freshman

class, who had never been inside their new school or met their teachers in person. Class schedules and teachers remain the same regardless of learning method as students at school and at home are being taught synchronously.

For teacher Peter Carlson, this hybrid model works well. "As a technology teacher, we teach students to embrace technology. I like that this model gives us real life applications and examples on a daily basis," he says. Carlson takes technology a step further as microphones in his classroom allow virtual learners to hear what is happening at school. He has a TV in the back of his room to see all his students as he faces forward, and a camera in the back of the room sends a live video feed to students at home. His Digital Media class, which consists of mostly 9th and 10th graders, welcomed the return to school sharing that it was easier to focus and that they get more done at school. Like many students, they also loved being able to see their friends.

In Kim Kolstad's French 4 class, about half of her thirty students returned to campus. A mix of all grades, they agreed that the return was a good change as one student admitted his grades were slipping from Distance Learning. But Kolstad was quick to point out that some students are doing better in Distance Learning. Like all teachers, she strives to serve all her students but admits, "It is difficult to teach both at times because as a teacher the division of attention can be tricky. Sometimes I feel like I am hosting a game show that has at home players as well as a live studio audience. Overall I am happy to be at work and I can feel the students' gladness at being in school. This entire experience has reinforced in me, how incredibly important a place, that public schools are and continue to be, in our society."

Outside of the classroom, the hallways remain a bustle (even with half as many students), but lunch has a very different feel. Students use their smartphones to scan a QR code at their table daily, in the event of needed contract tracing, and tables are limited to three so many eat outside or off campus.

It took a couple of weeks but students and staff are settling into their new routine, taking one step closer toward normalcy. The hope is to welcome back all learners for the next school year, when students can hug their friends around packed lunch tables.

Art + Activism = Artivism

Southwest Class of 2000 alum, Adam Johnson (his students call him "Mr. Johnson"), recently returned to the Southwest community with his family. You have likely seen his artwork in yards, on television in the hands of marchers and the front-page of international newspapers. Also, the Southwest Foundation included Adam's painting of Amanda Gorman in every backpack handed out to students, upon returning to school for the first time this year.

Adam loved drawing and painting as a child, but he really got into the visual arts when he began painting with his middle school students in the South Bronx ten years ago.

The math curriculum he was given was not engaging students and he had trouble building relationships with them. He integrated drawing and painting into his lessons and began an after school art club.


Similar to the Southwest Foundation's emphasis on funding extracurricular activities that complement a rigorous academic foundation, Adam found that his students' self-esteem increased, they fostered new thinking strategies and he noticed an improvement in their sense of identity.

The Southwest Foundation recently had an opportunity to interview Mr. Johnson:

SWF: What is "Artivism"?

AJ: As a universal language, the arts have always been an effective tool for addressing social issues. Artivism or "activist art" is a form of social protest that explores cultural and political concerns. It involves attempts to engage others, create awareness, amplify stories and voices and inspire positive change in society. Artivism fights for issues of social justice including racial discrimination, environmental justice, gender equality, fair labor practices, human rights and more.





AJ: The purpose behind my art is to amplify the stories and voices of the individuals I paint. Another purpose is to portray their humanity. My goal is to get the art in the hands of activists and people that are demanding justice and change. As an educator, I also seek to provide educators with art that enhances their lessons and classroom environment.

SWF: What impact has your art had? **AJ:** I have connected with activists throughout Minnesota and around the county. I've been able to provide them with art that adds unifying images to their demands for justice and change. The art is demanding justice for many lives that have been stolen and, unfortunately, many families have contacted me to paint their loved ones who have been killed by police.

SWF: How can Southwest students learn to express themselves through "Artivism? **AJ:** Cecily Spano and I have discussed carrying out an after school artivism club where we discuss social issues and create art to display our thoughts and feelings.

SWF: What impact did Southwest and International Baccalaureate have on your life? **AJ:** Southwest and International Baccalaureate helped me think critically about the world and question the status quo, and exam-

ine how history and intersectionality have shaped institutions and systems that in many cases produce oppression.

SWF: Did you have a favorite class at SW? **AJ:** My favorite classes at Southwest were taught by Cecily Spano, Ben Zhao and Patrick O'Connor. The content and discussions were meaningful, but how they treated me and genuinely cared about me is what I remember the most. Jamison Rusthoven also guided me in high school and helped me make important decisions after graduating.

SWF: Who inspires you? **AJ:** I am inspired by many people throughout history, and I often paint those who inspire me, but I am exceptionally inspired by the young people that I have worked with that are using their platform to speak up against injustice. Young people give me hope that our world will become more equitable and sustainable.

SWF: Any additional thoughts, advice, or comments for the entire Southwest High School Community (including alumni)? **AJ:** Our collective voice, fight and energy makes change more attainable. Use your voice and platform if you feel passionate about making change.

Singing Praises

This fall with school occurring virtually, the SW Foundation pivoted the annual grant requests to solely support staff needs during distance learning. Dozens of requests came in from all departments and nearly all were fully funded. Grants were approved for a computerized math program for special education students, guest artists for English classes and noise cancelling headphones for multilingual students. But one grant in particular had an immediate and immense impact.

Choir is the biggest elective at SW and Director Bryan Fisher was seeing the frustration among his students in not being able to sing together. He researched and found "Singalong," a collaborative online singing software that would solve this issue. Mr Fisher explains, "This software provides students with a convenient interface of singing to

their computer while simultaneously seeing a video of the conductor [me] and hearing the music. It has been wonderful to be able to provide this option for students to make recording at home a little smoother and a little less scary." He adds, "Thank you to the Foundation for the financial assistance during this difficult time of distance learning!"

In a year of no performances, "Singalong" now brings them to family and friends. And that's a good thing because not performing is a very sour note for Fisher and his students.

From Purple & White to the White House

The first 100 days have come and gone for President Biden's administration, one that claims to



be the most diverse in history, and can now also claim having a Southwest connection in National Security Advisor Jake Sullivan.

A 1994 IB Diploma graduate, Sullivan excelled in the political arena from early on. Before he was making his case to Presidents, he was making his case to competitors for Southwest's Debate and Quiz Bowl teams, in editorials to the student body in the school paper, or as Student Council President.

As Secretary of State, Hillary Clinton called him a "Once-in-a-generation talent" in a statement to the Star Tribune. "His Minnesota roots keep him grounded in the rough and tumble of Washington, and I have no doubt he will prove as invaluable to the next administration as he was by my side," she added. In a 2012 speech, she even referred to Sullivan as a "potential future president."

He also was a multi-tool athlete running Track, playing Soccer and Cross Country skiing. About his upbringing, biology teacher Theresa Rumppe said, "Thave to sing the praises of the IB program, and the arts, and the athletics. IB gives a real foundation on how to think. It also attracts people [like Jake] that want to think. Anyone can google anything these days. Not everyone can critically assess information." IB Coordinator, Lisa Ledman agreed saying, "IB is the path for learning how to think critically and globally."

Dr. Matt Whalin, a classmate of Sullivan's told the Star Tribune, "Every year, Southwest would produce some very strong students who would go off to the top colleges in the country. Jake, I think, stood out as the best of the best even among that group. Great sense of humor. Intense, but not in an overbearing way," Whalin added.

Longtime physics teacher Sherwood Bergseid echoed that as he recalls, "Jake was one of the most intense students I ever had."

His humor (and maybe foresight) was on display as his senior yearbook quote included, "FP [future plans]: Rule a country with a pewter fist." Sullivan is well on his way.

And for the first time, our girls entered the competitive cheer scene in virtual matches!
