## **Honoring Molly Malone**

From 1996 to 2000, Molly Malone walked the same hallways and staircases at SWHS as her mother Nancy and "Nanni" Mary Wing. She was a brilliant and hard-working IB student who gravitated towards science, and possessed a competitive spirit that enraptured those watching her excel at volleyball and basketball. Molly went on to Gustavus Adolphus College where she studied



Biology en route to becoming a Physician Assistant.

Molly's drive to compete and compassion towards those she encountered remained at the forefront of her interactions and accomplishments. More than anything however, she yearned to bring children into this world and nurture with devotion and pure love.

On May 29, 2014, 12 days after giving birth to her first and only child, Molly was stricken with an undiagnosed heart condition that abruptly took her life.

nationally in the top 3 in skate and top 10 for juniors. Libby quickly became one of my best friends. Along with Edwina, and the three of us were pretty much inseparable, and along with my teammates, were instrumental in fostering my love for the sport.

James Dundon was the SWHS head coach, and one of the toughest coaches I have ever had. He taught

me that the process is just as important as the outcome. Kate Ellis, also a SWHS coach, was a huge inspiration for me. She was a strong advocate for girls. She instilled the idea that hard work beats talent when talent doesn't work hard. Without these people, I would have never reached where I did in skiing.

At Northern Michigan University, I was part of a strong women's team, claiming 3 All-American finishes, including runner up at the 2014 NCAA Championships.

I now live in Anchorage and ski for the APU Nordic Ski Center. This season I qualified for the Winter Olympics and raced the 30k classic, finishing 21st. I then went on to join the US Ski Team on the World Cup. I train year round, racing November-April, and training May-November.

Outside of skiing, I adjunct teach at Alaska Pacific University in the Liberal Studies Department. I am also a program manager at Anchorage Downtown Partnership, where I run a summer program. Working helps me balance my athletic pursuits with the "real world," and helps pay for my travel and racing.

SWHS taught me to find my passion and follow it. We had amazing teachers who encouraged creativity, challenged us and have inspired me beyond my years at SWHS. I would encourage students to explore every opportunity you get.

#### **We ARE Southwest: Math Team**

David McMayer has been head coach of the Math Team for 12 years. For 12 years, Southwest has won the Minneapolis Division and has earned an invitation to the Minnesota State High School Math League (MSHSML) State Tournament. Approximately 170 schools across the state participate in the MSHSML. Southwest generally finishes the season within the top 20 in the state and finished in 7th place this year!

As a coach, McMayer is understandably proud of the superstars — the students who are seemingly able to correctly answer more questions than others. He is also proud of those who persevere. This year, they will induct two more seniors into the 100 point club. Both of these students have participated in math team

competitions for four years, and their achievement will be acknowledged on the math team century club plague, located in the flexible learning area on the second floor.

Southwest boasts some of the highest participation rates in the state. This year, 58 students were involved. During his tenure, McMayer has coached nearly 800 different students, and has seen over 650 individuals participate in at least one competition.

At each practice McMayer is continually searching for moments when a student might be able to serve as a mentor or a tutor for another. "Solve an equation for a friend and they might be able to turn in their homework. Teach them HOW to solve the equation, they will likely do better on the test, better in class, and eventually may be able to teach another. We learn most by teaching others."

Math team members stay after school for peer tutoring on Tues-

day and Wednesday, often working on extra material well beyond the requirements of their math classes. McMayer enjoys their conversations and recognizes their intentional approach to learning.

Math team is not only an activity for students who want to engage with material outside of the normal curriculum, but a great activity to connect with others, engage in advanced learning, and be part of the larger Southwest community.
