Dear Southwest Community,

The Southwest Foundation (SWF) and our supporters possess lofty expectations and goals, but also many achievements to celebrate.

The 2018-2019 school year saw the SWF establish partnerships with neighborhood/community councils, the Minnesota Orchestra, local businesses, civic leaders and Southwest stakeholders. We welcomed our new administration and thanked our interim with a "first of its kind" red-carpet ceremony. We continued to fund classroom programs, scholarships, experiential/ service learning opportunities and over 50 teacher/staff/student identified initiatives through our annual grant process. We collected one of our largest gifts from Dr. Betsee Parker and proceed with strong due diligence to ensure that money is spent equitably and with maximized impact toward the women's athletics department and teacher development per her wishes.

When I graduated from Southwest in 2000, the IB Program was strong but the school as a whole suffered from a glaring divide between the "haves" and "have nots". Student programs were non-existent (we didn't even have a choir) and academic expectations/accolades

were centered on all those who tested into the IB magnet (it was not a "World IB School"). Even then, scholarship money for the financially burdened who chose to engage in the world's most challenging curriculum was beyond scarce and deepened segregated cliques within our community. We were the "#1 ranked academic school in the State of Minnesota" but only a small percentage of the population was served.

In 2019, we have: over 60 student organizations; an entire school population immersed in the World IB Curriculum; programs designed to support the most underserved and raise their ability to succeed in courses; an inclusive morale that embraces diversity; symbiotic

community partnerships for service learning; and scholarships (during high school and post) funded by the SWF helping students participate in activities and preparatory academic opportunities.

Southwest has the highest graduation rate in Minneapolis. Our students accomplish this

feat while learning from the strongest curriculum and pedagogical approach in the world and through holistic engagement with the community.

Southwest High School is better than when I graduated; in large part attributed to the equitable distribution of IB and financial resources through its partnership with The Southwest Foundation.

The nonprofit sector is filled with ebbs and flows. This is natural but also incredibly stressful and frightening as realities of budget cuts continue to confront Southwest.

Perhaps a result of successful investments in the school, our fundraising is in an "ebb phase". When optics don't project "imminent disaster", financial support is tough to encourage however, for us to fulfill our obligations to students and teachers, we need help.

As we prepare for the 2019-2020 school year, we are way behind necessary balance targets. The SWF must raise \$150,000 to fund essential grant requests and our minimal operations (we are currently fueled by volunteer participation).

Your contribution is necessary for us to maintain this positive pattern and momentum for all of Southwest.

SW Foundation Grantees

The Southwest Foundation supports a wide variety of initiatives at Southwest High School, focused on academics, arts and athletics. Every spring, the Foundation encourages administrators, teachers and student groups to apply for grant funding. The Southwest Foundation Board of Directors, in collaboration with administration, reviews grant applications and allocates funding for the proceeding academic year. A few examples of initiatives that received financial support during the 2018-2019 school year include the following:

MN Orchestra Partnership

The Southwest Foundation was delighted to partner with the Minnesota Orchestra, to enrich the musical experience of Southwest High School students. Throughout the 2018-2019 academic year, Minnesota Orchestra musicians mentored Southwest students and further inspired their love of music. Southwest oboist Siobhan Dietz was thrilled with the experience,

saying, "when I was in the third grade, I went to a Minnesota Orchestra concert and was inspired to learn to play the oboe after hearing principal oboist John Snow. Meeting him now as a senior in high school is amazing and it all came full circle." In addition to working with professional musicians, Southwest students had the opportunity to perform in the Target Atrium at Orchestra Hall on Saturday, March 2nd.

Reid Wixson, Director of Instrumental Music at Southwest, is pleased with the partnership. "Bringing students to perform at Orchestra Hall is a wonderful opportunity and having musicians from the Orchestra come to work with our students has been spectacular. But the real benefit, from my perspective, is to cultivate a meaningful relationship between the students in our band and orchestra program, myself, and the Minnesota Orchestra. Through this relationship, we will be able to continue to connect with our community partners in the future."

Advancement Via Individual Determination (AVID)

Advancement Via Individual Determination (AVID) is a nationally recognized program that supports students who have shown academic promise but would benefit from additional preparation for college success. The mission of AVID is to close the achievement gap by preparing all students for college readiness. AVID students must meet one or more of the following criteria: will be the first in their family to attend college; identify as a member of a racial/ethnic group that is underrepresented on college campuses; qualify for free or reduced lunch; or have special circumstances that may be obstacles to success.

All seven Minneapolis Public High Schools offer the AVID program. However, Southwest boasts the largest program, with more than

200 participants. As AVID teacher Brian Meyer explains, "The AVID program at Southwest has various elements to it, but one of the most important is the strong sense of community that it provides for participants." To facilitate this positive communal element, the AVID team hosts a fall retreat in partnership with Project Success. Students are divided into small teams and participate in both small group and large group challenges. Project Success does an excellent job of creating activities that facilitate relationshipbuilding, cultural-sharing, reflection and trust.

Caroline Hooper, a Southwest AVID teacher, expressed her gratitude for the Foundation's support, saying, "my colleagues and I are incredibly grateful for the Foundation's financial support. Although we have the largest AVID program in the district, we receive the same amount of funding as other schools with much smaller enrollment. Foundation funds allow students to participate in a fall retreat, which builds trust and a sense of community." In addition to the retreat, Southwest Foundation funding allows AVID students to participate in college visits, which motivate and inspire them to plan for a bright and successful future. Japanese Exchange Program

Kyoko French, a native of Japan, founded Southwest High School's Japanese program in 1991. The program has expanded significantly during the past 28 years to include seven levels of Japanese (from beginner to International Baccalaureate), which is enjoyed by 140 students annually. Additionally, Kyoko established an annual exchange program with Kasugaoka Senior High School (Southwest's sister school since 2013), in Osaka, Japan in 2006. Approximately 12 Kasugaoka students visit Southwest each spring, and a group of Southwest students visits Kasugaoka each summer.

To help cover the costs associated with the exchange during the 2018-2019 academic year, Kyoko relied on a grant from the Southwest Foundation. "Without financial support from the Foundation, I would not have been able to create such rich and meaningful experiences for the both the Japanese and Southwest students. From the bottom of my heart. I really appreciate your support!" The grant allowed participants to enjoy quality time together exploring the Twin Cities, attending a Japanese class at the University of Minnesota, and creating a performance that was enjoyed by 400 Southwest students.

During their stay, Kasugaoka students stay with Southwest host families and spend quality time inside and outside of school with Southwest students. These interactions provide an exceptional opportunity for everyone involved to refine their language skills, gain a greater understanding of the similarities and differences between Japanese and American culture and benefit from an authentic immersion experience.
