## **Honoring Evan Karges**



After surviving brain cancer in 2010, Evan Karges appeared in three Southwest High School plays between 2011 and 2012: as Fauchelevent and a chorus member in *Les Misérables*; as a chain-smoking kindergarten teacher obsessed with death in the one-act

Odds Are; and – wearing a bedsheet toga and laurel wreath – as Homer in the student-directed Black Box production of *Vatzlav*.

Appearing onstage became Evan's favorite part of school (sometimes to the detriment of other subjects). But the cancer recurred in 2012, leading to a year of high-dose chemotherapy, two stem-cell transplants, and missing most of junior year. When the cancer was diagnosed as incurable in October 2013, Evan reluctantly withdrew from Southwest and earned his GED in May 2014. Evan died only a few months later on December 14, 2014.

In memory of Evan's substantive and joyful experiences in Southwest High School's theatre program, we have decided to make an ongoing donation in his name to the Southwest Foundation to benefit the theatre and music departments, and have included them in our estate plan in perpetuity. [Cont. p4.]

The boys remarked on how they learned how to find and interact with customers, share the work, administer their finances and provide a wide range of lawn care services. "I went from never mowing a lawn to being able to complete a lawn project including

weeding, trimming and landscaping on my own," remarked Charlie Shors.

The group chose both local and global charities to support. "Over the summer, we earned \$2,500 serving 25 customers. #### Dr. Betsee Parker '69

On November 20, The Southwest Foundation announced a considerable, \$250,000, contribution from Dr. Parker.

Dr. Parker's involvement with Southwest and the community began at a young age as both of her brothers also attended. In high school, she excelled academically but also grew frustrated with bias demonstrated toward male classmates and a lack of extracurricular opportunities for young women. As her life journey takes her acrossmany continents, into the presence of world leaders and amidst significant environmental and systemic challenges, Dr. Parker embraces direct engagement and philanthropy.

Dr. Parker recognizes that despite efforts to expand equality, inequities remain. With the designation of half her contribution to directly impact

Southwest Women's Athletics, she hopes it will expand opportunities but also communal confidence in an integral piece of development for young women; paths that did not exist when she attended Southwest.

The remaining \$125,000 of Dr. Parker's gift will focus on grant allocations pertaining to work in the classroom. With the designated pool of resources allocated through Southwest Foundation grants, Dr. Parker hopes teachers can find innovative, impactful ways to expand their classroom presence and subsequently give kids reasons to "want to learn."
